Dear Friends,

November, a month of deep remembering. I have reflected a little on Exodus 32:1-14 both personally and in worship recently. God is up the mountain and Moses is up there, too. And there's not been a peep from them for forty days and forty nights. The Israelites' response to this reflects a common human tendency when feeling powerless and miserable and faced with waiting and uncertainty: they get impatient and make some seriously questionable decisions.

The Israelites, aided and abetted by Moses's brother Aaron, decide they've had enough of not having things in their own hands or of controlling the timeline. And so, driven by some perverse nostalgia and an even more irrational trust in the values represented by a golden bull, an image made of riches gleaned from the Egyptian empire, the people throw God over for a sacred cow.

I can imagine this kind of conversation at the foot of the mountain: "That God is hard to understand. And this Moses seems to have done all he's capable of. And why did we think that God was so great again? Where is that God right now and what has that God done for us lately? We're the ones who've been doing all the heavy lifting. So our strength and vision and experience are enough. None of this is really that shocking. In fact, it's all rather painfully familiar.

What does seem shocking to me, is that God is ready to do the people in. But if anyone's paying attention, this God, of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, whose name is I am that I am and I will be who I will be, this God who chose to be in a relationship with a people who were from the other side of the tracks, this God is passionate and perfectly free to feel all the feels... and often does!

Good thing Moses was there. And Moses was there with God because God knew who was needed as a partner in the relationship and in the work with this people. Moses is the person for the job. In the face of God's hurt and anger, Moses acts as the people's advocate and as God's advisor. On the surface, Moses appeals to God's political reputation: "Do you really want the Egyptians to think you were just kidding about your love and compassion for the people Israel?" But actually Moses is saying "remember." Remember those you have loved through the ages, those to whom you promised your love, presence, and providence. Remember. Remember who you are.

What kind of God is the God of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Miriam, Esther, Ruth, and Jesus? The God of our spiritual tradition has moments of rage, disappointment and grief, but is, at the end of the day, compassionate, merciful, abounding in steadfast love and hoping for us to respond with love.

Moses doesn't forget who God is. Moses doesn't forget that God spared his life on more than one occasion, that God called him to speak truth to power, that God knew he was a murderer and still honoured him with the task of participating in the liberation of those in bondage. Moses doesn't forget who God is, a God who receives the cries of the suffering, who is gracious and merciful, who refuses to stand by while loved ones are oppressed, who lifts up the lowly, and makes a way when there seems to be no way.

Moses, in a stunning act of faithfulness, says to God, remember who you are. The outcome, in verse 14 we are told that after listening to Moses, God "changed God's mind." God remembers God's own heart of love and how much the people have already been through.

In such a time as this, a moment of crisis on so many levels, it is important to remember what is real and matters most of all. Remember what kind of God we serve, and how it is the love, justice, and compassion of that God we are made to enact in the world. Remember. Remember that the awful headlines do not represent the whole of the human family. Remember. Remember how God has been gracious and merciful to you when you didn't deserve it. Remember. Remember when God has brought you through. Remember. Remember when somehow you had enough to get by when you didn't believe it was possible. Remember. Remember that God has called you and empowered you to be yourself in the world, to offer your strength, creativity, vision, talent and kindness to the work of mending and making a gentler world. Remember.

Remember that you are a part of God's family, and your family name is Beloved. Remember. Remember that you are the person God needs right now to step up, to serve, to give, to pray, to love, to advocate, for such a time as this.

Dear Friends,

As we approach the Autumn of 2023, tragically the war in Ukraine does not seem any closer to ending. The number of people fleeing the war and arriving in Salisbury does however appear to have slowed so while we were initially meeting several new families a month at the Salisbury Community Hub for Ukraine we are now seeing fewer new arrivals. The Hub has proudly served the Ukrainian community in the city by providing support for housing, education, jobs and many other issues since it was established in April 2022. The focal point of our Hub has been at Salisbury Methodist Church which has been an incredibly generous host for our meetings and language classes that have run every week and provided an invaluable base for community connections to be forged and built upon. Along with the integration of the Ukrainian families into the local area and the establishment of their own successful communities and enterprises we have also seen a sustained increase in the provision of support from the Local Authorities.

Given these factors we feel that now is the right time to allow the Hub to evolve into an organisation that will continue to provide support as and when required, on a virtual basis, by accessing us through the email address below. The team will retain its online presence and continue to be available to provide information, resolve any issues arising and to sign-post. This change will take place after Friday October 27th after which the Hub will no longer be holding its meetings or language lessons on a Thursday or Friday morning at the Methodist Church and we will move onto our virtual provision. This will not include language classes but there are now many more options available for these at Wiltshire College and online.

It has been an absolute privilege for those of us involved in the Hub to work closely with the Ukrainian community and to witness their strength, resilience and optimism in the most challenging circumstances. We would also like to offer our sincere thanks to everybody who has been involved at the Methodist Church and to all the hosts and other organisations and individuals with whom we have worked over the last 18 months.

At the same time as the Hub at SMC will transition to a Virtual Hub we are truly delighted to confirm that the Ukrainian community will be relocating to a regular venue at St Martin's Church rooms where the group plans to run activities for children, teenagers and adults. We feel there is enough interest from our young people for this to continue, and I am writing to ask for some help. We are looking for adult volunteers of any ability, who play a musical instrument and who would be happy to join a 'music rota'.



We are looking for adults to assist the young people in playing instruments by providing some encouragement by being 'musical partners'. We do not expect volunteers to 'teach' the children, this will be addressed through other avenues. There is also no expectation to attend every month. For now, I am looking for expressions of interest.

The group will run on the second Sunday of the month on a termly basis following the school timetable. We will meet at 1pm for lunch and plan to JAM for an hour, finishing at 3pm-ish. We will be playing four songs per term, two modern worship songs and two pop songs to be chosen by Revd Mark.

In addition to the music, we are hoping this initiative will eventually provide an opportunity for young people to 'gig' and evolve the group to suit their needs, connect with others, make friends and grow in confidence within the Church family.

President and Vice-President update on the situation in the Middle East

As deaths and injuries of civilians continue to rise in the Israel-Hamas conflict, we are heartbroken to see the devastation this is having on so many people living in the region. We believe in a God who weeps, and, alongside the Holy Spirit our Comforter, our hearts are breaking with all those whose loved ones have had their lives brutally cut short, for the terror felt by Israeli families, and the unimaginable wait that many face for news of the people being held hostage. We watch in horror as Gazan civilians flee for their lives, unable to leave Gaza and trapped in the midst of a violent and unpredictable conflict.

The situation may feel overwhelming; so much information, so much misinformation and so much misery. Where is our hope? Watching and reading news reports can leave us confused and feeling helpless. What can we do? As members of the Methodist Church we have witnessed the plight of the Palestinian people's oppression for many years and have sought to encourage those on all sides who are working for lasting peace with justice in the region.

Now we pray for all those people and groups we have met: Daoud Nasser from the Tent of Nations and the recipient of the World Methodist Peace Prize in 2018; Rabbi Nava Hefetz from Rabbis for Human Rights, the Wi'am Peace and Reconciliation Centre in Bethlehem; the staff of the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme for Palestine and Israel, and the countless people and families in Gaza and the West Bank who we, as a Church, have supported over the years. We uphold them, praying for their safety, asking for God's protection and comfort. And we pray for those who have the power to effect change – that they will use this privilege wisely and well to put a swift end to this violence and aggression. We undertake to continue to pray that the beautiful peace of the Prince of Peace will manifest in our world, and we pledge ourselves once again to respond to the Gospel of God's love in Christ and to live out this discipleship in our worship and mission.

We call on the UK Government to do all it can to encourage dialogue between Israel, the Palestinian Authority, Egypt and states in the wider region. We urge our Government to use its influence to end the siege of Gaza that is depriving its population of water and food, and to call on all parties to abide by international humanitarian law.

As well as praying, we ask you to consider doing the following:

- Supporting <u>Christian Aid's appeal</u> and/or signing a petition calling on the UK Government to establish safe routes out of Gaza for people left homeless or caught up in the violence
- Find out more about the situation: <u>Resources for studying theological issues</u> relating to Israel-Palestine
- Write to your MP to ask them to act to protect civilians in Gaza and to support a lasting peace
- Be generous to those who you may not agree with, and try to find common ground. Pray for those people and, if appropriate, pray together. Be aware of

those in your church or community who are particularly impacted by this situation, whether they have a connection with Israel or Palestine or because this is a painful and traumatic reminder of their own experiences of conflict. And please pray for those in leadership who are being called to offer support to the people who are impacted by the ongoing situation.

From the Stewards

Since last month, it feels like the Stewards have been dealing with a lot of practical issues; worship materials for Christmas, and the pattern of Christmas services; the success of recent social events and how we might build on this. The Finance team and the Church Council have been considering how we can fundraise in a situation where our income broadly pays our outgoings, but the church needs to rebuild its reserves against future major expenditure. The Worship group has begun to consider whether we should offer alternative forms of services in an afternoon or evening.

The Christmas materials produced by the Methodist Church come under the heading "Out of the Ordinary"; Jesus' birth is at the same time both ordinary and extraordinary. All the ordinary things we are doing, the routine of keeping the church functioning and the building viable, are also part of an extraordinary agenda, to work for the Kingdom of God. Isn't it easy to attend the routine meetings, do the chores, and lose sight of the objective?

Something that <u>is</u> out of the ordinary, against the general trend, is that SMC is a growing church. We know that we can be good at doing the ordinary thing of being welcoming: at "Our Story" this afternoon, I was very struck by the number of people who said that they had come to SMC and stayed because people welcomed them. One person mentioned the effect of people simply smiling at them as they came into the sanctuary. We have to remember that is just as easy to forget these simple kindnesses.

Examples are encouraging and facilitating Carbon Footprint and Environmental Lifestyle audits, plus increasing the use of locally sourced foods for meals in church.

In the New Year I will be looking at how we can build upon the good practice already established, and plan for moving onto the highest-level gold award.

In the meantime, I would like to repeat my thanks to the church leaders and the wider congregation for their hard work in maintaining the drive to be the most ecofriendly community possible.

Christian Aid



Once again, anything I was going to write has been overtaken by world events. The terrible events in Israel and Gaza have driven last month's natural disasters and even the Ukraine war out of the news-stream.

Christian Aid has been working with refugees in Palestine since the 1950s. Even before this latest escalation of violence, the humanitarian need in Gaza has been acute for many years due to the 16-year-old blockade enforced by Israel and Egypt and a lack of effective government in Gaza.

Christian Aid has two partner agencies in Gaza; one, in the north, provides medical assistance, while in the south of Gaza another partner is already supplying mattresses, medicines and "a community kitchen that will feed 200 people". Amid reports of hundreds of thousands being displaced, there is a huge need for external aid and Christian Aid is already raising funds in anticipation of delivering aid when permitted.

If you are able to help, go to the Christian Aid website where their Middle East Crisis Appeal is prominent.

A Letter From The Network Of Christian Peace Organisations To The Foreign Secretary - Oct 2023

We write to you in response to the outbreak of violence in Israel and Palestine. We urge the UK Government to use its influence to help create space for de-escalation and meaningful dialogue in the coming days and weeks, to urgently avert a deepening humanitarian crisis and military conflict that could cost many more lives than have already been tragically lost.

Indiscriminate attacks on civilians violate international humanitarian law. We condemn the Hamas attacks on civilians and the taking of civilian hostages. We also condemn the response of the Israeli Government in bombing of Gaza and targeting of the civilian population. The increased restrictions and complete cutting off of water, electricity, food and fuel constitute collective punishment and will create an unprecedented humanitarian crisis in Gaza, exceeding that which already exists as a result of the 16-year blockade.

We are deeply saddened by the continued violence in the region and urge you work for dialogue and de-escalation. We ask you to support measures for the immediate protection of civilians including a ceasefire, adherence by all parties to international law, and the UN's call for humanitarian corridors.

Long held concerns about land, peace and security have not been prioritised by the international community. The only way to break the cycle of violence and build a lasting peace is to end the Israeli occupation of the West Bank and the blockade of Gaza and create conditions of justice, equality and peace for all Israelis and Palestinians.

As people of faith, we stand against the Islamophobia and antisemitism many individuals in this country may face as a result of violence in the Middle East. We will do what we can to de-escalate these tensions.

We ask you to avoid supporting polarised arguments and apportioning blame. We ask you to support measures that do not rely on military security but instead build a lasting peace based on justice and equality for all.

Five Minutes for the Planet Blister Packs again!

Lots of us use tablets that come in blister packs, and there have been ups and downs with recycling them. When we collected them at SMC we quickly had hundreds, and around that time Superdrug decided they couldn't cope with people recycling in bulk.

You can still recycle small quantities of blister packs at Superdrug in the Old George Mall (the box is just in front of the pharmacy desk), but now Terracycle, who handle a lot of "difficult to recycle" items, have set up a new scheme for recycling by post.

Here's the weblink The Aldi Blister Pack Envelope Recycling Scheme · TerraCycle

Not the snappiest of titles, but it's very easy to use if you have a PC and a printer. It works by offering freepost labels for you to post your used blister packs to the scheme.

If this doesn't work for you, I am told that Avon Lodge Veterinary Group in Stratford Sub Castle accepts bulk loads of blister packs. They are open Monday to Friday 8am - 6.30pm and Saturdays 8.30am - 12.30pm. reception@avonlodgevets.co.uk

Our Zambia Link:

Zambia celebrates 59 years as an independent nation on 24th October this year. To give thanks for that, there is a display in the North Corridor at SMc from 16th October to 20th November about Zambia, about the United Church of Zambia (UCZ) and about our link congregation, St John's UCZ, Mtendere.

Pray that the rains will arrive in Zambia in November. As we heard at Holiday Club in August, these rains are essential after 6 months with no rain, so that the crops will grow, so that the rivers and lakes will be replenished and so that Zambia will have enough electric power from the hydroelectric schemes on the Zambesi and Kafue rivers.

Pray for pupils in school preparing for school leaving exams at Grades 7, 9 and 12. These exams are at the end of November and during December, at the end of the school year.

Pray too for the ministers and deacons in training at the UCZ University who are completing their courses before starting ministry in January.

At St John's UCZ, Mtendere, the congregation give thanks for growth in numbers this year and for full resumption of church activities after the Covid restrictions. One new project the Chelston Consistory has recently started, is eye screening through the Community Development and Social Justice group. This is a much needed provision.

Continue to pray for the people of St John's congregation, as they pray for us.

Awareness Raising Market Stall

On Saturday 30th September Listeners from The Listening Place manned a market stall to raise awareness of their work. It was hailed 'a great success' by Publicity Officer, Jill Lakeman. She said "We had

a brilliant day. Members of the public visited the stall, and we were able to explain our service. Some expressed interest in training to become Listeners and some people came up to say 'thank you' for the help they had received from The Listening Place. That was particularly heartwarming."

Established nearly 20 years ago, The Listening Place provides a friendly and safe place where people can share whatever is on their mind with a Trained Listener. Listeners don't interrupt, advise or judge but, by listening, can often help to find a way forward. The service is completely free and confidential. No notes are taken or kept and only first names are used.

'Now, more than ever, people need our Listening service', commented Sue Robbins, Manager of The Listening Place. 'We are probably unique in Salisbury, as we provide walk-in, face-to-face sessions, where people can talk through their problems, worries or concerns'.

Based at Salisbury Methodist Church in St Edmunds Church Street, Salisbury, two hour sessions are held on Wednesday and Saturday Mornings between 10am – 12pm and Monday evenings from 5.30pm – 7.30pm. The aim is to provide accessible times for workers and non workers. Appointments can be made by phone to ensure a Listener is available, but drop ins are welcome. Coffee mornings are held on Wednesday and Saturday mornings in the Foyer of the church which provide a warm and relaxed environment. Private rooms are available for Listening sessions. Three Volunteer Listeners are in attendance at each session.

Although based at and supported by Salisbury Methodist Church, Listeners come from all walks of life and all faiths. They undertake a course to become Listeners and through this, become aware of the power of listening. As one Listener commented 'I thought I was a good listener before I trained, but the course improved my listening skills immeasurably and I now use them to help friends and family members as well as at The Listening Place'.

Courses are held regularly both to recruit new listeners and for individuals and organisations wishing to improve the listening skills of their staff. Three new Listeners have recently joined the team - if you think this might be for you then please get in touch with us.

Amesbury Methodist Church Eco Fair

Christian Churches across the world have been encouraged to mark the Season of Creation, which starts each year on 1 September, the Day of Prayer for Creation, and ends 4 October, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology beloved by many Christian denominations.

Throughout the month-long celebration, the world's 2.2 billion Christians come together to care for our common world. As part of our response to this, a group from the Circuit Justice and Peace Group organised an Eco Fair at Amesbury Methodist Church on Saturday 30th September. We hoped that people from the other churches in Amesbury and the Circuit, and the local community would come along and be prepared to spend some moneys on various stalls, learn about climate change and related subjects, and what we can all do to work for climate justice, and also recycle some household unwanted bits and pieces such as greetings cards, stamps, printer cartridges, spectacles, pens, bras, mobile phones and other electronic goods. Reduce, Reuse, recycle being a good motto.

We were delighted that the Mayor of Amesbury came and opened the event at 10.00am and in the attached picture the Mayor Councillor Monica Devendran is pictured with the organising committee: The Reverend Rosemary Fletcher (Methodist Minister for Amesbury), the Reverend Anna Bishop (a Methodist Minister from Salisbury) along with her 11 year old daughter Grace and Jim Gillings (the Eco Champion of the Salisbury Methodist circuit). Amesbury Methodist Church are working to becoming an Eco Church and this event was part of their mission to become more environmentally aware and alert the local community to issues involved with climate change, climate justice and care of the environment.

Stalls included:

Extinction Rebellion bringing to our attention the need for climate justice, Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, Clothing Exchange, Christian Aid - many of the countries with whom Christian Aid work are affected adversely by Climate Change, Medic to Medic, Kindness Naturally, Greetings cards made from old cards in aid of the Diocesan Sudan medical Link – Amesbury is in the Anglican Diocese of Salisbury. I also attach a picture of the Card Stall with David and Katharine Callard. Other stalls included Eco Church/ A Rocha, the local Food bank, an Artisan Woodwork stall – locally made woodwork items, Traidcraft - Fair Trade items - Amesbury Methodist Church is a Fair Trade Church, Plant stall in aid of Alzheimer's Support, and lots of containers to collect things for recycling e.g., Printer cartridges, Stamps, Mobile phones and small electrical goods, bras, pens, greetings cards to name a few, and also Eco heating sources and how to make bird feeders and seed bombs - this was outside on the field behind Amesbury Methodist Church and was organised by 11 year old Grace. Photo attached also. The stamps go to the RNIB, printer cartridges for the

Girls Brigade for their fundraising, mobile phones to Christian Aid, so our recycling helps others. Spectacles went to SpecSavers for use in the developing world.

The plant stall added to the total for Alzheimer's Support from the event on 29th September, the Card Stall raised £144 for the Sudan Medical Link, £154.20 was spent on the Traidcraft Stall and the Woodwork stall raised £91.00 towards Amesbury Methodist Church Funds.

A good time was had by all – thank you to all who helped and all who attended.
