Ministers letter.

Dear Friends,

To accompany the winter preaching plan I wrote a note that seemed to connect deeply with some that read it, and so I have included that note in this letter. I wrote, as I sit and write this letter, I remain confronted by the pictures, reporting, and sheer horror of what is unfolding in Israel and Gaza. There are few words to describe my reaction to the violence, terror, and destruction of humanity. Heartbroken for the people involved is all I choose to write.

I wonder what compassion, anger and sorrow rests within God's being today. We believe in a God who weeps with those in such distress as this, we believe in a God whose total commitment to humanity results in the sending of His own beloved Son. God's victory over violence, injustice and hatred in this world is accomplished and shown through a bloodied body, Jesus, dying upon a cross. The work continued through a transformed yet apparently recognisable Jesus following the resurrection. God's surely breaking heart works the miracle of God's love in the shared brokenness of those people whose loved ones suffer.

Through our winter preaching plan:

- We enter & travel beyond the active waiting & watching of Advent. As we watch in horror at events in our world, God does not wait, he acts even now in the hearts and minds of those who have power and control over the horrors we see. We pray that God's gift of the Prince of Peace brings clarity, wisdom and an ending to the violence and oppression of our siblings.
- We will celebrate the birth of Jesus, a refugee, a helpless child reliant upon others for his safety and protection as he grew and matured. We surely pledge ourselves once again to respond to the Gospel of God's love in Christ in word, thought, deed and love.
- We will affirm in our Covenant service that we are committed to God's service, each of our gifts, graces, skills, and brokenness given for the relief of suffering and the growing of God's Kingdom.
- We are then left wrestling with how to live out such discipleship in our worship and mission which not only changes each of us but transforms the world around us.

Transformation in the world, that seems rather daunting! In trying to break that down a little, I turned to you. I am often moved by your generosity to one another, exploring and sharing faith with the people around you who are perhaps held in moments of grief, or stretched by the demands of life, seeking to respond to the need you see around you. Such love for one another marks SMC as a community of faith open to and being transformed by God's love, which in turn brings us closer to one another and closer to God. Such love for one another demonstrates how deeply you wrestle with the realities of this world and find a way to transform one another's lives and thereby bring an element of change to the world.

I pray that God's beautiful gifts of this season assure you that you are loved, fills your lives with the power of God's Spirit, and blesses you as you in turn are a blessing to those around you.

It's true that they show a decline in both membership and attendance from 2016 to 2020, and then everything was disrupted by Covid. Since 2021, however, there is a gradual but steady increase in the numbers of both Members and those attending on a Sunday morning (both adults and children).

We can rejoice, and be both thankful and encouraged, but also we need to be alert to ask what is God doing here, and perhaps also why?

Smaller numbers can also be significant. Three is the current number of Church Stewards, who meet regularly with our ministers and support them where possible. After April 2024, there will only be two, where as we would like to have four.

Two is the ideal number for preparing tea and coffee after the Sunday service. It is always appreciated, and just think what it would be like without it! If you are not sure what is involved, please speak to Carolyn Clark, who will try and pair you up with an experienced coffee-maker.

And one (or at least one) is the number of people we need with an enthusiasm for the work of the Salisbury Food Bank. In the New Year we will be taking a bigger role in making arrangements for the Foodbank on a Saturday morning, and we would like to hear from someone willing to get involved in this.

Often it only takes one person to make a difference. Please consider if you feel you could offer to help with any of the above.

Finally, 25 is also a significant number, and the Stewards wish you all a very happy Christmas!

Our Zambia link:

Praise God that the rains have begun, and pray that they will continue.

In December the United Church of Zambia (UCZ) looks forward to Christmas. The week before Christmas is “Christmas Revival Week” in the UCZ, when, in church and in all the church groups, we preach and pray that Christ will be born again in the hearts and lives of each of us and in the lives of people who have not been Christians.

December is also the month of public examinations, when school pupils write their school leaving examinations – after Grade Seven, Grade Ten and Grade Twelve. Pray for the young people doing their exams – and for their teachers and the people involved in marking the exams.

As in the UK, December is a month when people look to give support especially to children. Zambia has many thousands of orphans because of the HIV/AIDS pandemic, so we work and pray to support the orphanages and organisations that support orphans through school and higher education.

At our link congregation - St John's UCZ in Mtendere, Lusaka - we are asked especially to pray for the three robed choirs and for the Boys' Brigade Band and for the witness they give to the birth of Jesus and the salvation he brings.

Continue to pray for the people of St John's as they pray for us.

With extra Advent and Christmas sales, so far November has seen shop takings increase to approximately £709, plus a special Zaytoun order of £282.00 and a bumper Cathedral stall of £513.20!

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was filled with sorrow at the tragic death of his wife in a fire in 1861. When the Civil War broke out the same year, it seemed like an additional punishment. Two years later, Longfellow learned that his son had been seriously wounded in the Army of the Potomac.

Sitting at his desk, one Christmas Day, he heard the church bells ringing. It was in this context that Longfellow wrote these lines:

I heard the bells on Christmas Day
Their old familiar carols play,
And wild and sweet
The words repeat
Of peace on earth, good will to men!
And thought how, as the day had come
The belfries of all Christendom
Had rolled along
The unbroken song
Of peace on earth, good will to men!
Till, ringing, singing on its way,
The world revolved from night to day,
A voice, a chime,
A chant sublime
Of peace on earth, good will to men!
Then from each black, accursed mouth
The cannon thundered in the South,
And with the sound
The carols drowned
Of peace on earth, good will to men!
It was as if an earthquake rent
The hearth-stones of a continent,
And made forlorn
The households born
Of peace on earth, good will to men!
And in despair I bowed my head;
"There is no peace on earth," I said;
"For hate is strong
And mocks the song
Of peace on earth, good will to men."
Then pealed the bells more loud and deep.
"God is not dead, nor doth he sleep!
The wrong shall fail,
The right prevail,
With peace on earth, good will to men!"

Wiltshire Air Ambulance volunteers can no longer collect recycling from Salisbury. Please continue to recycle as much as you can. Look at the 'Compendium of Recycling' on the church website for a comprehensive guide to what you can recycle where.

At SMC we ask you to bring in these items which will raise money for Medic2Medic, a charity which helps to build the health workforce in some of the poorest countries in Africa.

- Dental products – toothpaste and toothbrushes
- Plastic coffee packaging
- Biscuit wrappers and cake bars plastic packaging
- Plastic bread bags and bakery packets
- Pens
- Printer cartridges

We also collect mobile phones and foreign currency for Christian Aid and used stamps.

Amnesty International, Write For Rights 2023

"Why Write for Rights? Because our words work wonder". These are the words of Amnesty stating how cards and messages and letters sent last year have helped in the release of Cecillia Chimbiri and Joana Mamombe in Zimbabwe who had been arrested and imprisoned after participating in an anti-government protest. Similarly Chow Hang-tung, a human rights lawyer from Hong Kong imprisoned for peacefully commemorating the victims of the Tiananmen Square massacre. So, this year on Sunday December 10 we shall again have a table in the hall after the service for people to send cards and messages - and a contribution towards postage would be appreciated.

December 10 happens to be the 75th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights which established that human rights belong to everyone, everywhere - something which we too need to be vigilant of.

OUR STORY

About twenty of us met for a shared lunch in the Hall after Sunday worship and coffee; some who had been involved in the very first discussions between churches that led to the creation of what we now call “SMC”, and some who have joined the church family in the years since the new building opened in 1992. We touched on our older Methodist heritage, with John Wesley’s visits to Salisbury in 1738, the new chapel in 1811, and the ups and downs of subsequent years.

SMC is now what is called a “gathered church” (as opposed to a parish within set boundaries), but when we asked where people had been born, we found that we were gathered from all parts of the British Isles, and beyond. Unfortunately we did not have time to map all our individual faith journeys to arrive at SMC, but we heard from Brian Mould about how music and his faith had led him to surmount numerous obstacles, and from Sarah Sirengo about how her trust in God to answer prayer had brought her to the doors of SMC.

However each of us came to be here, when we asked why people had stayed, the commonest response was simply “because I was made welcome”. This simple act of welcoming was so basic and so important, yet something that we all can do.

The last question was “what would you like SMC to be in the future” – in a single word! The WordCloud [on the back cover] now includes all our answers to that question, as well as our places of birth, work and professions, and significant dates in our history.
