Minister's letter.

Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

Dear Friends,

It seems to me that time comes and goes so quickly, as you read this, I shall begin the privilege of receiving a sabbatical. These are used in different ways by colleagues, amongst my time away from Circuit and Church work I hope to spend a little more time in the garden than possible in the normal working pattern of life.

Have you noticed that there are two specific and detailed references to gardens in the Easter Story?

1: Following the momentous events of 'The Last Supper, Jesus prays, 'Father, the world does not know you, but I know you; and these know that you have sent me. I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me, may be in them, and I in them.' After Jesus had spoken these words, he went out with his disciples across the Kidron Valley, to a place where there was a garden, which he and his disciples entered. (John 17:25 – 18:1)

Gethsemane was a garden on the Mount of Olives where Jesus went to pray to his Father and express his concerns and doubts about his role in God's plan to bring salvation and redemption to the world by his death on the cross and his resurrection. Accounts of the visit to Gethsemane can be found in Matthew 26:36-56, Mark 14-32-51, Luke 22:39-53, John 18:1-10. Each of the accounts are similar in content but different in detail and emphasis. Each agrees that Jesus came to the Garden to pray to his Father and share his deepest thoughts. For me, this is Jesus, the human being, sharing with his Father his own concerns about his work of bringing salvation and redemption to his people. He expresses doubts about his role in the amazing, sacrificial act of love he is called to undertake. Although Jesus struggles, his final words are put simply in Luke 22:42 'Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet not my will but yours be done.'

In his 'human' response to his task Jesus places his future into God's hands taking the step of faith we all need to take. Jesus goes back to the disciples and, according to Luke, found them sleeping--exhausted and says to them, "Why are you sleeping? Get up and pray that you may not come into the time of trial.' (Luke 22:46) They awake, and get up, and go to meet that 'time of trial' which, for them it is the arrest and mock trial of Jesus which leads to humiliation, Crucifixion, and the death of

Jesus. Jesus goes from Gethsemane to Golgotha without complaint, and in love gives his life on the cross for all, including you and me. 'Amazing Love! How can it be? That you, my God, should die for me? (Charles Wesley)

Garden 2: The story does not end there, and we come to the second garden featured in the story. At the end of that horrendous day of Crucifixion, in fact, in the evening a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, a disciple of Jesus went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus; then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. Joseph wrapped it in a clean linen cloth and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn in the rock. He then rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb and went away. (Mt 27:57: Mk 15:42: Lk 23:50, John 19:38-41)

It is John who specifically mentions the garden. But, as we know, it didn't end there either. Again, the four Gospel writers record the events with their own emphasise and their accounts are recorded in Matthew 28:1-10, Mk 16:1-8, Lk 24:1-12, John 20:1-18. We are told that after Jesus was laid in the tomb some of the women - Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, Salome and perhaps some others came to check on Jesus's body. They went away to prepare the spices used to embalm a body. In the early morning of the day after the Sabbath, they returned, but found the stone had been rolled away and the tomb was empty! Jesus was not there, and, in various ways, they were informed he had risen as promised!

They were instructed to tell the disciples that Jesus had arisen!

Through his prayers in the garden, Jesus accepted the difficult task before him, and God's love and power went with him to the amazing, triumphant end! Over the years there have been times when I, and likely many of you, have faced situations causing worry and concern in everyday life and then at other times decisions to make. I suggest a response to God's call to serve, no matter what, might lead us into a much-loved outdoor space to pray to God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and to the love and power sufficient to achieve what God has called us to do or say. I pray it may be so.

Mavis moved from Hucknall, Notts, to live with her daughter Lesley and enjoyed worshipping with us as a Member for six years before increasing dementia led to her move to Willowcroft Care Home four years ago. She loved singing, was sociable, warm and friendly and everyone remembers her lovely smile. She was very grateful to Sandra and the late Paul Gunstone who brought her to church every week and was very fond of them both.

We give thanks for the well-lived lives of these dear ones. May they rest in peace and rise in glory as they are reunited with their beloved husbands. We hold their families and friends in our prayers at this sad time.

We continue to remember all those known to us who are struggling with ill health or other anxieties. May they know the comfort and strength of God's love upholding and sustaining them.

Greetings from the new Outreach Worker

As I write this, I am watching the sun catch a patch of daffodils blowing in the breeze. There are signs of spring and new life starting to appear around us. Taking up this role is a new pattern of life for not just me but my family too. It is an exciting time that marks not just a beginning but also the end of a period of transition and change for us. Over the lockdown period my children seemed to suddenly grow into independent young people far less dependent on me leaving me with more availability to work. Having spent most of my working career serving people in the entertainment and hospitality industries, Covid left me searching for new opportunities and trying to work out what I was meant to be doing. After a period of reflection and exploration, pushing several doors and learning much about myself this role presented itself, and here I am. Some of you already know me, some may think they do and I am a new face to others. So who am I? I am a single parent to three teenagers living in Alderbury. I have been a member of SMC for 23 years and am currently training as a local preacher. My youth work experience has been within the voluntary sector, serving as a scout leader for 20 years, involvement in various church groups and most recently as a leader with a home education community learning hub. My hobbies include hiking, exploring new places, sewing, history and eating cream teas.

Spring is in the air and soon we will be seeing lambs leaping around in the fields – a true sign of spring and new life. Easter is also a sign of new life – death to resurrection – Jesus alive again and meeting up with his followers. One meeting can be read in the Gospel of John, Chapter 21:15-17, when Jesus cooked them breakfast on the beach, but:

¹⁵ When they had finished eating, **Jesus** said to **Simon** Peter, "Simon son of **John**, do you **love** me more than these?" "Yes, Lord," he said, "you know that I love you." Jesus said, "**Feed** my **lambs**." ¹⁶ Again Jesus said, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He answered, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Take **care** of my **sheep**." ¹⁷ The **third** time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" **Peter** was hurt because Jesus asked him the third **time**, "Do you love me?" He said, "**Lord**, you know all things; you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Feed my sheep.

I wonder if you remember that Peter denied Jesus after he was arrested? Three times Peter said he didn't know Jesus but then the cock crowed and Peter remembered that Jesus had told him this would happen. I wonder what words you can think of to describe how Peter might have been feeling then? You can probably think of a lot with your family and friends helping.

But, of course, Jesus knew that Peter really did love him. He knew that Peter had made a mistake and wanted to forgive him and for Peter to forgive himself, so it was important for Jesus to ask Peter three times if he loved him and to hear Peter's answers.

Jesus also told Peter to feed his lambs and take care of his sheep? *I wonder what Jesus meant* by that? Who are his lambs & sheep? How could Peter help?

From the Stewards

One item of business for the Church General Meeting on 25th April is the appointment of Stewards. This arrangement was set up to support the Minister in his or her work, to look forward and support the life of the church between Church Council meetings.

We are now in urgent need of new Stewards; currently we only have three; Paul Butler, Helen Browncross and Jacqui Saunders, and Jacqui will stand down in April.

The Stewards meet with Rev Mark once a month. Our job is to stand back a little and take an overview of church life. The agenda for our meetings is very varied; recent topics have included the appointment of a new Outreach Worker, kitchen safety, and how to develop our work with children and young people.

SMC has many busy people in the congregation, doing good work for the life of the church, and we are particularly looking for Stewards who may not have found themselves a role yet, and may be able to offer a fresh perspective.

Please prayerfully consider whether this might be a role for you: you don't have to have been attending SMC for years, and there is no upper or lower age limit; the main requirement is a willingness to get involved, and another member of the congregation who will second your nomination (Nomination forms are available from the Church Office).

Stewards should be members of the Methodist Church, or seeking membership. If you are interested but would like to know more, or to attend one or more Stewards' meetings as an observer to see what goes on, please talk to Rev Mark, to Paul Butler or Helen Browncross. Christian Aid Week Sunday 12th to Saturday 18th May 2024 SMC will hold its Christian Aid Service on Sunday 5th May.

Christian Aid will be asking us to focus on the situation in Burundi; where, malnourishment and poverty affect more than 70% of the population. Jobs and food are hard to come by, and those who have homes often have no electricity or running water.

In Christian Aid Week we will hear the story of Aline, a young woman from Burundi. She was married, and gave birth to her eldest son, when she was just 14 years old. Aline experienced constant abuse at the hands of her violent husband. After a few years he married another woman, forcing Aline to flee. He prevented her from taking their children with her, and told the local community that Aline was mentally ill and unable to care for her children.

"I wandered the streets, asking anyone for a place to sleep. Those who showed me kindness would let me stay for two or three days, but it was difficult. People would insult me and treat me with contempt. They forgot I was a human being. It filled me with sorrow"

Christian Aid provided Aline with the chance of a new life. She took part in a transformative three-day community workshop, funded by Christian Aid.

"I came out with amazing knowledge and skills. The trainer restored a sense of hope and energy in me," says Aline.

With a small start-up loan from a Village Savings and Loans Association, Aline started trading avocados and peanuts locally. With her profits, she bought a bicycle so she could transport greater quantities of goods to markets further afield. Eventually, her hard work had finally paid off, and she had earned the money she needed to rent a house.

Once Aline secured a home for herself, her three eldest sons were able to escape their father and join her. Today, Aline lives peacefully on her own plot of land in a remote village in the Kayogoro Commune in Makamba Province. She's baked her own bricks and is building a strong home for her and her children in every sense.


Now Aline can afford food, clothes and essential healthcare for her family. She's also purchased solar panels so her children can do their evening homework by electric light.

"I like to feed my family with the produce that I grow, such as beans, vegetables and corn. I am so happy that we are together. Now my children feel supported as they have a parent who can meet their needs." - Aline.

Burundi continues to be one of the toughest places on earth to live, and the future is always uncertain. When a ferocious storm destroyed Aline's home, almost killing her and her children, she was able to recover by selling the cows she'd been keeping. She now has resources, options and a great deal of resilience to cope with future challenges.

The third ceremony that day involved the bride being carried in by her brother-in-law then processing seven times around Andy with leaves in front of her face. They then exchanged garlands three times before singing and dancing completed the day. Mou will be joining Andy in Chelmsford at the end of March so we look forward to helping her adjust to our climate!

A Statement from the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference on the situation in Gaza

22 February 2024

We are deeply disappointed that the headlines today are about a parliamentary process and not the horrors of what is happening in Gaza. Such a vote should be above party politics and we urge the UK government to denounce actions that epitomise a collective punishment of the population of Gaza.

The scale of the destruction and tragic loss of life in so short a space of time is incomparable to any other conflict in recent times. We grieve for all lives lost on 7 October and in the subsequent fighting. There is no justification for such widespread killing of tens of thousands of innocent people and we are gravely concerned for the entire population of the Gaza Strip.

One and a half million people currently shelter in crowded conditions with little food and water in the city of Rafah. The horrific strikes on southern Gaza have killed many in recent days and those injured are unable to get treatment because of Israel's attacks on hospitals.

We were alarmed to hear reports that the Nasser Hospital in Gaza has been shelled, killing patients, staff and others sheltering there. The protection of hospitals during a war is a basic and inescapable requirement in international law.

The International Court of Justice has called on Israel to ensure that its forces do not commit any of the acts covered by the Genocide Convention. Yet attacks on Gaza have continued with inadequate regard to the protection of civilians. For those crowded into Rafah there is nowhere left to go. It is disturbing to hear that some in the Israeli government are discussing the possibility of creating settlements across the Gaza Strip. Time will tell whether what we witness in Gaza today is an ethnic cleansing of the present population.

Meanwhile, for those sheltering without food and water the situation is critical. To meet the basic human needs of such a large population there is no alternative to an immediate ceasefire. We urge our Government to demand an immediate halt to the shelling for the preservation of innocent life and require that Israel abide by the provisional ruling of the International Court of Justice.

We call on Hamas to immediately release the remaining hostages and urge all governments to work with Israeli and Palestinian parties to achieve an agreement that ensures protection, support and a viable future for innocent victims of this conflict and security for all in the region.

In prayer we stand alongside all those in the region whose heart breaks with ours as we witness the unfathomable suffering. With the psalmist we pray:

You are my help and my deliverer; you are my God, do not delay. (Psalm 40:17)

We cry out to you, in anguish and horror, at the situation in Israel - Palestine The images we are seeing, the stories we are hearing, of homes, hospitals, places of sanctuary, healing and care, destroyed.

We know that there are so many more stories which have not yet been told, and perhaps never will be,

Of precious lives lost, of grief and trauma beyond that which most of us can imagine.

Compassionate God, you came and dwelt among us; you know and understand the suffering of this world.

There is no place beyond your reach; you are everywhere, even in places where we fear there is no hope left.

Where we are tempted to despair, your spirit brings mercy, and justice, and healing.

You call us, again and again, in times of conflict and destruction, to be attentive to those who are most vulnerable.

Give us the compassion to weep with those who weep, and mourn with those who mourn.

The discernment to recognize the limits of our own wisdom, and to avoid those actions and words which may cause further harm.

Inspire in us a renewed commitment to walk humbly with you, seeking the peace and flourishing which you desire for all of your beloved children, Amen.

A big thank you to all our church family for the weekly or monthly donations made to the Church. Last year we were able to claim £17,000 from the government due to members who have signed up for the Gift Aid Scheme. This is a government incentive whereby the Church can claim an extra 25%, on all donations made by taxpayers, so long as the gift aid does not exceed the amount of tax the person pays in the year. As you can see this extra money costs nothing and makes a tremendous difference to the income of the Church. For every £10.00 given we can claim an extra £2.50.

The claim for 23/24 is going to be made in April/May.
