

June 2024 Minister's Letter

Messengers

It suddenly strikes me With overwhelming force: It was women who were first to spread the message of Easter – the unheard of! It was women who rushed to the disciples, who breathless and bewildered passed on the greatest message of all: He is alive! Think if women had kept silence In the churches.

There are always many anniversaries in any given year and this year some of them are about women's ministry.

This year Methodism celebrates the 50th anniversary of the ordination of women to the presbyterate (priesthood). Whilst earlier Methodist groupings such as the Primitive Methodist Church and the Bible Christians had ordained women, it was not until 1974 that the Methodist Conference ordained the first women presbyters following Methodist Union in 1932.

And this year the Church of England celebrates 30 years of ordination of women to the priesthood. Both Churches had had women deaconesses and deacons before these dates. And not forgetting that this year is 10 years since the July 2014 General Synod voted to allow Church of England women priests to become bishops.

In the 1950 the Methodist Conference had declared that there were no theological reasons why women could not be ordained to the presbyterate but at the time there were conversations taking place with the Church of England about re-union and women priests were a stumbling block to the then Church of England. So, the Methodist Church kept their decision on hold (the Congregational and Baptist churches in England already had women ministers ordained to preside at the Sacrament of Holy Communion). So many women who felt a call to a priestly ministry within the Methodist Church had a long wait. And an even longer one within the Church of England. When the Anglican/Methodist Covenant talks failed, the 1972 Methodist Conference voted to allow women to be trained as presbyters. So,

on 2nd July 1974 the first women were ordained presbyter in the Methodist Church at the Bristol Conference. In November 1992 the Church of England synod voted to allow women to be priests, so 1994 was a year of great joy as I attended ordinations in cathedrals in Bristol Cathedral in March (the first one of colleagues in the Bristol Diocese (I was working in ecumenical parishes in Swindon at the time) and the next month in St Albans Cathedral of friends I had trained with at Queen's Theological College. Interesting that both firsts happened in Bristol.

On Saturday 15 June 2024 Salisbury will celebrate the 30th anniversary of the first women's ordinations in the Church of England with a special service held at Salisbury Cathedral. The Bishop of Sherborne, The Rt Revd Karen Gorham will preside, and Bishop June Osborne, former Dean of Salisbury, will preach at this service as one of the first woman to be ordained in 1994. Other female priests ordained in Salisbury at this time, as well as those currently living in the diocese, will be personally invited by the Bishop of Salisbury.

All are welcome to come and join this special service at 11:00am on 15 June in Salisbury Cathedral and enjoy hearing the girls' choir sing!

It is worth noting that within the worldwide Anglican communion the Reverend Florence Li ministered in Hong Kong and Macau during the chaos of the Second Sino-Japanese War and World War II. She was ordained first as deacon (1941) and then as priest (1944), which was very controversial at the time. So, 80 years since her priesting!

As some of you know, James and I worked as Mission Partners in Sri Lanka (2005-2010) teaching in the Theological College of Lanka where Anglicans, Methodists and Baptists trained for the Ministry, and we were privileged to be present in the Cathedral of Christ the Living Saviour in Colombo in September 2006, when the first women deacons were priested there. Shame it does not end in a 4!

I had a Roman Catholic colleague once who was very committed to the ordination of women to the priesthood in the RC Church and he rejoiced in the ministry of women and said that the Risen Christ was neither male nor female and transcended all human barriers.

Charles Wesley wrote a hymn about the first Easter that has not found its way into any hymn books, reflecting that it was the women who stayed at the foot of the cross who were first at the empty tomb. More courageous than the men, When Christ his breath resigned, Women first the grace obtain Their living Lord to find; Women first the news proclaim, Know the resurrection's power, Teach the apostles of the Lamb Who lives to die no more.

"Women first" – a bold statement for Wesley's day, and even more striking for Jesus' time. Dorothy L Sayers wrote, "No wonder that women were first at the cradle and last at the cross. They had never met a man like this man", a man who treated them as totally human. Not only last at the cross but first to know of the resurrection, and the first witnesses to the life changing news. At first their testimony was discounted as an idle tale, but they soon became "apostles to the apostles."

Remembering that we are called to be Easter people throughout the whole year, we give thanks for this fuller expression of the truth glimpsed on that first Easter morning and that we are all called to be witnesses to the risen Christ, and work for his Kingdom here on earth.

Christian Aid

Many thanks to all those who helped in the Christian Aid service including the young people and adults who read, Liz who prepared the slides, Jonathan who rescued me from a musical mix-up, the AV team and everyone who made the service go smoothly.



Charlotte Scott, Christian Aid's British Churches Relations Officer, came and spoke to us about how UK charities have learned from experience that the best aid is that which gives local people control of their futures. Christian Aid week focused on the story of Aline from Burundi, who had overcome enormous obstacles with help of training (delivered by one of Christian Aid's local partner organisations) in micro-finance.

Aline founded, and benefited from, a Village Savings and Loans Association. Friends and neighbours in the same village each contribute regular amounts of money. These can be very small, but lumped together and loaned out to individual members they can fund significant changes.

Aline was able to start and develop her own business and become financially independent. As a result she has built her own house and been re-united with her children.

Christine gave us examples of how Christian Aid itself can provide relatively small sums that are used to meet locally-identified needs. This might be maintaining a vehicle in Ukraine that provides a lifeline to people in isolated villages, or funding solar powered lamps that enable children in Burundi to complete their homework after dark.

The poor are always with us, the needs of the world can seem endless, but your donation does go towards making life better for someone.

SCAMS

Recently there has been a particular increase in calls to landlines purporting to come from the police at Bourne Hall. A number of members have also received emails supposedly from someone known to them requesting money or an amazon voucher.

Do you know what to look for?

- Incomplete or misspelled words
- Uses emotions fear, curiosity, greed to manipulate you into providing personal information, passwords, logins etc.
- Often asks for urgent action to avoid a negative consequence, or gives an excuse why they cannot phone you.
- Includes attachments or links to a fake website.
- Tells you you have won something, or offers something that seems too good to be true.
- Impersonates legitimate companies, organisations, or individuals to gain the recipient's trust. An email address that is close but not quite right: amazon<accounts@mazon.com>

Do you know how to report 'Phishing'? – come along to the next '**Get Connected'** and ask.

Do you know how to report a spam text? – Use 'Block and Report' from the menu or forward it as a text to 7726 (this spells s-p-a-m on the keypad).

If you are worried you may have been targeted please tell a trusted friend before responding.

Fairtrade News



Some of you may have noticed that there was no mention of Fairtrade Fortnight in the church's calendar this February/March. That was because it has yet to be. It has been moved to September 2024 to coincide with the 30th anniversary of the launch of the Fairtrade logo - now a symbol with which we are familiar and one which denotes the life-changing impact for farmers and workers

across the world. To quote from Quarterly Return, the journal of Shared Interest: From its modest beginnings in 1994 with one chocolate, one coffee and one tea on shop shelves, Fairtrade in the UK has grown to 450 companies now licensed to trade 6,000 Fairtrade products. So, watch this space for September 2024.

Stock news: We have some new items for you to try including Green Tomato Chutney and jars of Sweet Piquante Peppers from Eswatini. Apparently, the peppers are a favourite at True Origin headquarters. They can be eaten straight out of the jar as a delicious snack or '*they can be stuffed with cream cheese, or sliced and put on sandwiches, pizzas, pastas, salads' etc.* They are at the special trial offer price of £3.00. Traidcraft Muesli was always very popular but has been unavailable for some time. 'We are Fair Trade' are now offering a Fairtrade Fruit and Nut Muesli once again which we're looking forward to trying. We will also be trying Ecoleaf toilet rolls as we're not happy with the quality of the current brand! Mango jam is also back in stock. Having kept the price of Divine chocolate bars at the special offer price of £2.00 for a very long time, they will be going up to £2.20, still a bargain compared with other outlets.

Shop takings from 24 March to 17 April were approximately £700, plus £60.00 from a Zaytoun sale. Over the last 4 weeks sales have totalled approximately £360.00.

On 25th April the Church General Meeting appointed two new stewards. Your stewards now are Paul Butler, Helen Browncross, Jo Throp and Kate Newton. Please feel free to approach any of us about general church matters.

Under the heading "Conversation on the Work of God at SMC", the meeting was asked to consider four statements about SMC, derived from our review of how we work with our children and young people.

- 1. We understand that growing in faith as a young person (and adult!) takes a community of loving people supporting each other in faith.
- 2. We understand that God speaks to each of us differently; we want to respond by reviewing All Age Worship so that the whole Church family can have opportunities to praise God in different ways.
- 3. We think young people should have opportunities to serve the Church family and live out their faith through experience; we should offer roles and opportunities to young people so they can, if they choose, serve others.
- 4. We think it is important for us to play a role in understanding the factors influencing young people today and our culture's impact on their faith, or barriers to being open to God, so we can respond effectively.

The meeting was asked to discuss these statements in small groups and respond by indicating enthusiasm, hesitation or a need to know more.

Statement 3 attracted a high level of support, and the stewards will now be looking at ways to put this into practice. Statement 2 was also popular, with support both for improving how we do All Age Worship, and for alternative forms of service such as cafe church. Implementation of this may have to await Mark's return! Full details of the feedback from the discussion groups will be included in the CGM minutes in due course, and copies of these will be available on request.

"A refugee is someone who survived and who can create the future."

As we approach Refugee Week (17 – 23 June) Diana and I have reconfirmed with Refugees at Home (Registered Charity: 1177765) our availability for "emergency hosting". Diana wrote previously about our long-term guest during Covid – an amazing man from Syria who had suffered terribly both there, and on his journey but who is now settled in London with a good job, contributing much through the charity he and other refugees founded. Through my continuing role at a Community Hub run jointly by International Care Network (Registered Charity 1099400) with Migrant Help at a church in Bournemouth our spare room has been needed sometimes by asylum seekers and refugees including a referral for "emergency hosting" from Refugees at Home. "Reza" came to us via a very complicated set of 3 separate bus journeys from Plymouth, via Bristol and Warminster one late evening a few weeks ago. Refugees at Home had contacted us a few days before to ask if we would take him, so we had time to prepare the room etc. He had been granted refugee status; an Iranian academic who objected to the regime in Bagdad and no longer accepted Islamic teaching. We were only a temporary refuge for 10 days until his longer-term hosts near Portsmouth were back from holiday and ready to take him. Given his background as a University academic, proximity to UK universities such as Portsmouth and Southampton made sense.

We are now waiting for our next "emergency" guest. Since Salisbury is not a city which has Home Office asylum accommodation we tend to be asked for shortterm hosting when people are "exited" from hotels or shared homes once they receive their refugee status. Increasingly this is happening with only a few days' notice such that many of them risk becoming street homeless, so we expect to receive more guests from places like Plymouth, Bournemouth, Bristol and even Taunton. (At least we know the bus route options from Plymouth now!).

So, if you are thinking of doing something practical to recognise Refugee Week, Diana and I would heartily recommend offering a spare room to Refugees at Home. They provide excellent support and information for Hosts and Guests and they check in with you while the Guest is staying. You can also limit your offer to short term/emergency hosting. We have asked them for their information leaflets ready for Refugee Week but their website is also very comprehensive: <u>https://refugeesathome.org/</u>

Methodist Homes:



On 16th June, we shall have our Methodist Homes (MHA) Sunday.

Methodist Homes began more than 80 years ago to provide homes for poor elderly people. Now it is one of the largest not-for-profit care providers, giving care and support to people in later life – and in a variety of ways.

MHA has care homes and nursing homes and residential homes and retirement villages. There are also homes which provide specialist care for people with dementia.

Some elderly people want to continue living in their own homes, and to support them MHA has 76 local "**Live at Home**" schemes, providing activities, advice and friendship to more than 9,000 elderly people.

MHA's **National Befriending Scheme** ends loneliness and isolation for people by enabling contact – by telephone, online or face to face – with a friend.

And there is a free **MHA Active App** which gives access to an interactive world created for an older audience.

Methodist Homes Sunday will encourage us to give money to MHA, which is to fund the particular provisions by which MHA enables people to live later life well:

- **Chaplaincy**: there is a dedicated chaplain in each MHA care service; the chaplain is there for all residents and their families and for members of staff.
- **Music Therapy**: MHA has pioneered music therapy, which is proven to reduce the isolation and symptoms of dementia.
- **The Final Lap**: This programme empowers MHA staff to talk openly and positively with residents and their families about death and dying. MHA helps each person to find meaning and purpose in life, even at the end of life.
- And the Live at Home schemes, the National Befriending Service and the free MHA Active App are all funded from the charitable giving to Methodist Homes.

The Bible passage for Methodist Homes Sunday is Jesus' parable of the mustard seed, a small seed which grows to a big tree (Mark 4:30-32). Likewise, a simple gesture of conversation can grow into an enriching friendship, which makes all the difference to someone's life. The ministry of an MHA carer, chaplain or volunteer visitor can make all the difference at MHA.

Hakuna Matata Choir Comes to Salisbury

It will be a real privilege to welcome this Kenyan Children's choir to Salisbury Methodist Church at the end of June. The choir are aged between 12 and 16, and all are from the Connect a Child orphanage in Kenya. The visit is part of a UK tour intent on spreading God's love while raising awareness of orphans and vulnerable children in Kenya.

The high spot of the visit will be the Sunday service on June 30th at SMC at 10.30 when the choir will sing and dance and tell their story. Afterwards the children have been invited to sing in The Cathedral and after a free tour they will get the chance to experience Evensong. The following day they will visit two Primary Schools to perform and meet the children.

The choir and their accompanying adults will be welcomed as guests by ten generous host families for four nights with a room set aside for lessons at SMC.

Please join us for this rich, cultural worship experience so different from our normal services and learn more about the life of many children in Kenya.

In a "normal" year, this is the end of the rainy season in Zambia. But this year, the rainy season hardly began; most of the maize crop, Zambians' staple food, has failed. In many rural areas there is not enough food and a shortage of water.

In the towns and cities, the effect is to raise prices, especially of food, and also daily power cuts.

Most of Zambia's electricity is generated by water – hydro-electric schemes, and there is not enough water in Lake Kariba or the rivers generating electricity.

Pray that the aid Zambians desperately need will be given and delivered very soon.

In June, the United Church of Zambia (UCZ) observes Health Sunday, praying for and supporting especially the hospitals and clinics the UCZ runs. Pray for Gina Siatwinda Oliver, UCZ Health Secretary, whose contract ends in August. Give thanks for her work and pray for the appointment of a successor.

On 26th June, UCZ churches will have Mission Sunday, giving thanks for the growth of the church and for its ministry in witness, caring, education, healing and work for social justice. Pray for the renewed commitment of each church member to mission.

At our linked congregation of St John's UCZ, Mtendere, Lusaka, pray for the congregation as they pray for us. Pray for the new minister to be appointed for St John's and for Revd Godfrey Gama, Chair of the Chelston Consistory, of which St John's is part.
