

Minister's Letter for Ascension-tide

It always seems a shame to me that Ascension Day is a Thursday, and Ascensiontide a very short season, and so the doctrine remains a great perplexing mystery to most worshippers, or an irrelevancy or one we just do not think about except when we say the Creed. So, I am taking this opportunity to share some thoughts with you. This year Ascension Day falls on Thursday 9th May, 40 days after Easter Day. In my last appointment we, at Marlborough Road Methodist Church, worked closely with our sister Anglican Church of St Peter's and our first act of worship on Ascension Day was to climb the tower and sing hymns for Ascension Day and look out over St Albans. It was especially beautiful when Ascension Day coincided with the pink blossomed cherry trees being in bloom. And in the evening, we had a Eucharist Service together. By the way, there are services at the Cathedral on Ascension Day Thursday 9th May – such as the 5.30pm Choral Eucharist. But no tower climbing!

One of the reasons why the doctrine of the Ascension is difficult is because the story of Jesus ascending into a cloud really is too much for most of us. But what does the story signify? Jesus' departure was described as upwards. In the Old Testament the clouds are symbols of God's glory and Jesus' union with God is symbolised by his absorption into a cloud. But these are not the only difficulties.

What was the Ascension?

Certainly not an event like the Crucifixion or even the Resurrection. At most the Ascension was the final appearance of the Risen Christ to his followers. If you like, an explanation as to why they no longer saw Jesus with them. Only St. Luke who has a keen sense of history and chronology describes the event.

But if the Festival of the Ascension is so difficult and there are so many questions, what are we left with?

- 1. The Ascension of Christ symbolises the heavenly realm, of which we are now a part, through the life and death and resurrection and ascension of Christ. All that was human in Jesus is taken up into God. All that is human in our lives is made holy.
- 2. The Ascension is also the declaration that Christ reigns in glory. The Christ who is glorified is the Jesus who walked the way of love, who was crucified, died and rose again.

3. John and Charles Wesley saw the connection between Ascension and the Eucharist and were influenced by the writings of Daniel Brevint who said that "now Christ has gone to heaven, He sends down on earth his graces that spring continually from his everlasting Sacrifice, and from the continual intercessions which attend it. the sacred body of Jesus fills with atonement and blessing the remotest parts of this temple." ¹ (Kenneth Stevenson: *All The Company of Heaven*)

Christ is King of peace and love who longs for his rule to be supreme overall. His mission to establish God's peace and justice on earth <u>must</u> become our mission.

We as Christ's followers live in two worlds; the world as it is, and the world God longs for it to become. We are called to share in the tasks of God of uniting the two worlds, so that the Kingdom of this world becomes filled with the qualities of God.

And so, it seems to me that the Ascension expresses truths about our faith in this way:

Firstly, we are called up into the Godhead and God is united with us and secondly, we are not only with Christ, but we are also with a Christ who reigns over all and in all and through all and who seeks to work through us in redeeming the world. This is why causes such as Christian Aid, Amnesty International, climate justice, environmental issues and links with Zambia, Fair Trade, the World Church, the Listening Place, the Circuit Justice and Peace Group, concern about Gaza, the plight of refugees and many other issues in which we as a Methodist Church and Circuit are involved are important. Through imperfect human institutions and we frail human beings, God works for the redemption of all humanity and the whole of creation.

Mark wrote about our need to be a Justice Seeking Church last October and this links in with Ascensiontide.

Ascensiontide make it clear that we are to be witnesses of the Good News of Jesus Christ – and this means that we must live our lives according to his example and his word. Christ's message is one of peace, reconciliation and justice – and we cannot separate our faith from the needs of our world...

An old legend recounts the time when Jesus ascended back into heaven after He had died on the cross and rose from the dead. According to the legend, the angel Gabriel met Him. Gabriel frowned when he saw the marks of Jesus' scars of His

torturous years on earth, especially the wounds of His crucifixion. Gabriel said, "Master, you suffered terribly for those down on earth." "Yes, I did," was Jesus' reply. Gabriel continued, "Do they all know now about your life and your forgiveness? Have they all heard about your death and resurrection?" "No, not yet," said Jesus. "Right now, only a handful of people in Palestine know about my death and resurrection."

Gabriel looked perplexed. "Then," he asked, "Well... How will everyone learn about your wonderful life, sacrificial death, and your resurrection and ascension?" "I have asked Peter, James, John, Mary and Martha and a handful of friends and followers to tell others about it. And when other people hear and believe, they, in turn, will tell others. And Gabriel, by and by, the whole earth will hear the message." Still frowning, the angel responded, "But, hmmm, you know how people are on earth. What if they... What if Peter, James, and John get tired and Martha is too busy? What if they tell the story, and the next generation gets involved in other pursuits? What if, way down in the 21st century, people aren't committed any longer to their commission? Have you made other plans?" The Lamb of God looked directly at the angel of God and said, "I have no other plans. I am counting on them" (Author Unknown).

In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.

I began to pray with all my might for those who had in a more especial manner despitefully used me and persecuted me. I then testified openly to all there what I now first felt in my heart. But it was not long before the enemy suggested, "This cannot be faith; for where is thy joy?" Then was I taught that peace and victory over sin are essential to faith in the Captain of our salvation; but that, as to the transports of joy that usually attend the beginning of it, especially in those who have mourned deeply, God sometimes giveth, sometimes withholdeth, them according to the counsels of His own will.

(I suspect it would happen whatever copy date was chosen!). My thanks also go to those who have responded to last month's pleas for new Stewards, but anything that happens at the Church General Meeting on April 25th will have to be reported in the next edition.

I recently had the opportunity to go to Bristol and to visit John Wesley's New Rooms there: it was very well presented and certainly worth the visit. One display sets out succinctly the objectives that Wesley pursued in his lifetime:

- Reduce the gap between rich and poor.
- Seek to ensure full employment.
- Introduce measures to help the poorest, including a living wage.
- Offer the best possible education.
- Empower individuals to feel they can make a difference.
- Promote tolerance.
- Promote equal treatment for women.
- Create a society based on values, rather than on profits and consumption.
- End all forms of enslavement.
- Avoid engaging in wars.
- Avoid narrow self-interest and promote a wider world view.
- Care for the creatures with whom we share our planet.

I don't claim to know where all these principles are expressed in Wesley's writings, but as it is still possible that we might have a date for a general election by the time the next newsletter is printed, you might like to measure our future candidates against them.

It seems almost impossible to think that I have now been in post for almost seven weeks. What a whirlwind! Several folk have asked what I've been up to so I thought I would give you an update.

It has been a joy to get to know so many lovely families whilst facilitating the toddler groups on Tuesdays and Fridays. I've brushed up on my children's songs and nursery rhymes and thoroughly enjoyed some very thought-provoking conversations with 3 year olds.

Little Blessings have created some lovely craft to offer in their worship and proved to be a very thoughtful and welcoming bunch.

At JAM we have sought to get to know each other better and started to explore ways of expressing ourselves and our faith through music. We have some great plans in place for the next few months.

The uniformed groups Easter eggstravaganza gave me a chance to meet families from outside the church whilst making Easter cards together. I had great fun with Café on the Green's Easter event too exploring the Easter story through crafts, video and singing. It has been lovely getting to know more of our church family through the family lunch at Sarum college, Lent breakfasts and other church events. Exploring difficult topics, such as health, education and the cost of living crisis, that are very real for families in our city through the Lent lectures at the Cathedral brought home just how important our work amongst local families is. Our Zambia link:

The drought in Zambia during the first months of the year- the months of the rainy season – has ruined the harvest and resulted in food shortages, water rationing and power cuts, because there is not enough water to generate electricity through the hydro-electric schemes Zambia depends on for power. Pray that the necessary food aid will be given and delivered.

The outbreak of cholera, which killed hundreds of people in Zambia is now under control. We give thanks for that and for the work of vaccination, treatment and prevention.

Bishop Lordwell Siame of our linked Lusaka Presbytery of the United Church of Zambia was in the UK briefly, mainly to attend the induction of Rev Dr Michael Hopkins as the Moderator of the United Reformed Church Wessex Synod on 23rdMarch. This expresses the commitment of both Wessex Synod and Lusaka Presbytery to sustain and strengthen our link.

Continue to pray for our link UCZ congregation – St John's, Mtendere – as they await the induction of a new minister. Pray for the former minister of St John's – Rev Godfrey Gama – in his new appointment.

The suffering in Zambia does not hit our headlines. Let us with our particular link to the UCZ keep up our concern and prayer, as the people of St John's continue to pray for us.

John and Charles Wesley

John & Charles Wesley are both remembered on May 24th in the Anglican cycle of prayer

Born at Epworth Rectory in Lincolnshire, John Wesley was the son of an Anglican clergyman and a Puritan mother. He entered Holy Orders and, following a religious experience on this day in 1738, began an itinerant ministry which recognised no parish boundaries. This resulted, after his death, in the development of a world-wide Methodist Church. His spirituality involved an Arminian affirmation of grace, frequent communion and a disciplined corporate search for holiness. His open-air preaching, concern for education and for the poor, liturgical revision, organisation of local societies and training of preachers provided a firm basis for Christian growth and mission in England.

Charles shared with his brother John the building up of early Methodist societies, as they travelled the country. His special concern was that early Methodists should remain loyal to Anglicanism. He married and settled in Bristol, later in London, concentrating his work on the local Christian communities. His thousands of hymns established a resource of lyrical piety which has enabled generations of Christians to re-discover the refining power of God's love. They celebrate God's work of grace from birth to death, the great events of God's work of salvation and the rich themes of eucharistic worship, anticipating the taking up of humanity into the divine life.

John died in 1791 and Charles in 1788.

How 5 Shillings, Faith and Belief inspired the beginning of the Probation Service

Did you know the forerunner of the modern Probation Service was established in Victorian London with a donation of only five shillings?

This was a world where many endured desperate poverty and hardship. Early work undertaken by missionaries included setting up jobs, accommodation and opportunities. Some stories are heart-breaking – a boy turned out onto the streets after his father sold his boots to buy beer. But there was hope! Many were placed on farms and elsewhere and learned skills including poultry, pig and cattle farming as well as trades.

In this new touring exhibition from Englesea Brook Chapel and Museum you'll learn the origins of the Probation Service and how early Christian values and principles behind the work would go on to be rolled out across the world.

This Exhibition will be at the New Room in Bristol from May 1 - June 29. As a former probation officer and inspired by its Christian roots I hope to go (by train) and would welcome the company of others. Please speak with me if you are interested and also pass word to others.

Five Minutes for the Planet The Library of Things

If you haven't come across the Library of Things, it describes itself as:


"A social enterprise which gives the community access to borrow things they need, without it costing the Earth".

In other words, rather than buy an expensive tool you will only use for one job, or something just for a single event, you can borrow it at a very modest cost. So many things end up languishing in the garage, or even being thrown away after several years gathering dust. You do have to go to Churchfields to fetch it, and return it when you have used it, but you save money and the planet benefits because there is no need for yet another thing to be made, purchased and eventually disposed of.



Why Do We Celebrate Pentecost?

Pentecost is important because even though Jesus was not with his disciples any more, they were seen as worthy to spread the message of God, which is why He sent them a Helper to do this. The Holy Spirit equipped the disciples to spread the message of God by telling people about Jesus, God's Son. The Spirit gave them gifts to perform miracles and speak in different languages so everybody there, from many different places, understood what they were saying. Many, people were baptized on that first Pentecost because of what they heard and saw. Pentecost is believed to be the point where the Christian church started (its birthday if you like) and broke away from the Jewish faith, basing its beliefs on Jesus and His teachings rather than on Jewish laws or doctrine.

South Sudan is the newest country in the world, and one of the poorest. Within its capital city, the Juba Diocesan Model Secondary School is one of the most successful secondary schools in the country.

Unusual in South Sudan, the school educates both boys and girls in roughly equal numbers, providing a boarding house for some of the girls to avoid them having to travel daily through the dangerous streets of Juba. If anyone can help solve the problems of violence, poverty and corruption in this country - to say nothing of managing the hoards of refugees from war-torn Sudan to its north - the alumni of this school stand a very good chance.

JDMSS took in its first 90 pupils in 2007. The initial set-up costs of the school were largely contributed by St Francis church in Salisbury. More than 900 pupils are at the school now, many of them supported by a bursary scheme so that those who cannot afford the fees may also attend.
