

Ministers Letter

In case you do not know, we have a General Election this July! Some people in the world do not have the opportunity to vote, or to vote in free and fair elections, while there are other countries in the world where voting is compulsory. In the UK we have a choice, but it is the duty of all of us who are eligible to cast our vote.

In May we remembered our founding fathers John and Charles Wesley. Do they have anything to say about being engaged with the political issues of our day?

John and Charles Wesley had no time for those who thought Christianity should not engage with the world. For them there was no holiness apart from social holiness. (For John Wesley, he thought that we discover holiness, and grow in grace through being with each other in discipleship communities. What does this have to say to us about our mission statements?) As far as both John and Charles were concerned, it was the role of every Christian to make the world a better place:

To serve the present age, my calling to fulfil; O may it all my powers engage to do my Master's will! Charles Wesley StF 658

Gary Best, a contemporary Methodist historian, has written a paper called Wesley's Political Manifesto which includes the following:

"First - and foremost - reduce the gap between rich and poor. Wesley thought poverty 'contracts and depresses the mind' and he said it was a disgrace that in such an affluent country, abounding with 'all the necessities, the conveniences, the superfluities of life', there was so much squalor and vice. He was not popular among the upper classes because he constantly challenged their rich way of life."

"Both the Wesleys were highly critical of slavery. As young missionaries in Georgia in the 1730s they had incurred the wrath of the colonists by supporting a ban on the possession of slaves. In 1774 John published his 'Thoughts Upon Slavery' - the first truly successful piece of antislavery writing. He poured scorn on the concept that black people were inferior to white people, he graphically depicted the worst horrors of the slave trade, and appealed to the hearts of his readers: 'Did the creator intend that the noblest creatures in the visible world should live such a life as this?

Who can reconcile this treatment of the negroes...with either mercy or justice? I absolutely deny all slave-holding to be consistent with any degree of natural justice....'"

John Wesley encouraged people to take a different world view in two respects. First, he promoted the concept that all people of all races were children of God - they were all our brothers and sisters, and they were all therefore of worth. This belief had for him - and it should have for us - profound implications on how we should respond to what is happening in other parts of the world. For example, Overseas Aid, and on how we should treat refugees and asylum seekers.

Secondly, John Wesley constantly urged people to look beyond what society deemed acceptable and to be guided instead by the gospel message. The gospel offered a different world view - one not governed by commerce and the pursuit of wealth but by a desire for fairness and justice for all. The 2023 Methodist Conference has directed us to be a "justice seeking church" and this desire goes right back to the beginnings of Methodism.

The report includes these words: "As Christians we're called to seek God's justice. Justice that enables everyone, and all creation, to flourish. Justice that removes everything that diminishes people, that oppresses or exploits them. Justice that enables us all to grow in relationship with each other and with God."

Does any of this help us decide who to vote for on Thursday July 4th? As Christians we must vote according to the principles of our Gospel, where we are called to care for those who are marginalised, and those who are poor and struggling in our society. Let us reflect on the ministry of Jesus when we cast our vote. May we remember that we are all children of the same living, loving God, who cares for all.

Loving God, as the election approaches, may we seek to better understand the issues and concerns that confront our country and how the Gospel compels us to respond as faithful citizens in our community. We ask that each one of us will use our votes wisely and we ask for the spirit of discernment. Help us to continue to follow in the steps of Jesus and be guided to your Kingdom of justice and peace. May your kingdom come on earth as is heaven and may we all work for that day. We ask this in the name of your Son Jesus Christ and through the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Father of Fairtrade

Father Frans van Der Hoff was a Dutch Catholic missionary who died recently. He was a co-founder of the global Fairtrade movement.

He lived simply and worked alongside poor residents in Mexico for most of his life.

In 1988 he started arranging for coffee beans to be exported from Mexico to Holland where they were sold in European countries and in 1994 adopted the Fairtrade label.

He believed in the power of social organisation to advance the interests of poor farmers. In 1982 he encouraged the coffee farmers to create a co-operative, which quickly expanded and today has more than 2,600 workers in 56 coffee growing communities.

Father Frans' idea caught on because it was a way for poor farmers and their communities; to earn what we might term a living wage and for consumers to be sure that no-one is being exploited.





Fairtrade News

As previously mentioned, this September is the 30th anniversary of the Fairtrade Foundation and we are looking for a possible way to celebrate at SMC. If any of you have ideas do come and speak to anyone on the shop rota. The Methodist Recorder tells us that the anniversary will get off to an auspicious start when it becomes an official campaign partner with the Glastonbury Festival. For the first time all the organic cotton used to produce the official festival merchandise, including t-shirts sweatshirts and tea towels, will also have the charity's endorsement.

It has been a busy time with extra stalls to promote Fairtrade at various events in our community. It was good to have positive responses from folk at the People in the Park event in May (£191.10) and at St Mark's Eco Fair on 8 June (£153.40). The usual May Cathedral stall takings were £399.50. In June, following the Dean's talk at the Cathedral where Pip had been asked to provide a stall selling Zaytoun Palestinian goods, takings were £921.90 following the Dean's helpful plug! There will be another opportunity to hear the Dean speak of his Sabbatical in Jerusalem as an Ecumenical Accompanier, and also to support Palestinian farmers through Zaytoun, on Wednesday September 11 at St Thomas's.

New stock has arrived! Fairtrade Fruit and Nut Muesli is back, along with Traidcraft Breakfast Blend Tea bags, which were always one of our best sellers. We now at last have a source of Fairtrade biscuits too, 2 types of organic Belgian Speculoos, made in the traditional way, so plenty of new things to try.

Shop takings for the last 5 weeks were approximately £369.50.

The Stewards have been dealing with a very varied in-box in recent weeks. The Church Council on 4th June approved the idea of a means for people to write their prayers down during the week, so that they could be offered as part of the service the following Sunday. A small group will decide what form this should take.

In view of the increasing numbers of groups now using the church premises, the Council approved the purchase of a defibrillator, to be positioned inside our premises. These devices can be lifesavers, though at the same time we hope that we may not have to make use of it.

Increased numbers also mean that the premises need to be cleaned more often, and the meeting agreed in principle that the church should pay a cleaner to look after the toilets and kitchen in particular. This will probably involve two early morning sessions each week.

Meanwhile, Little Blessings and JAM are looking for someone who could give up one Sunday afternoon a month to help out with catering, as both these events involve providing food for the children.

If you know of anyone who would be interested in either role, please contact the Stewards (Paul Butler, Kate Newton, Helen Browncross and Jo Throp).

The last Circuit meeting heard from the District research worker, who has been looking at the possibility of a "New People, New Places" initiative in Fordingbridge, where the Methodist church has recently closed. This "plant" would probably be led by an outreach worker or a Deacon, and would focus initially on social need.

Finally, at the top of the Stewards' in-box this week has been the uncomfortable news of a theft of a cheque from the church donations box. The box has now been fitted with a padlock and we are reviewing security generally. In view of this, please be careful not to leave valuables unattended anywhere in the building, but particularly in the foyer.



Gratitude for Friendship
